

CLIMATE ACTION ON CAMPUS








WHERE IS BIKE HUB?


UVic Campus Bike Centre is located in the Jamie Cassels Centre (JCC), the same building as Mystic Market.

PLANT-FORWARD FOOD BY DESIGN

UVic Food Services follows the Greener by Default food architecture model, where plant-based foods are the default, and diners can opt into meat/dairy options.



DID YOU KNOW

UVic's dining facilities, including The Cove with its <u>Passive House</u> kitchen, prioritize sustainability through energy-efficient design and plant-forward, low-carbon meals. Campus food options include vegan, vegetarian, halal, and made-without-gluten choices.

WHAT CAN YOU DO?

TREAT YOURSELF

UVic is a **FAIRTRADE-CERTIFIED** campus. Enjoy fair-trade coffee, tea, and chocolate almost anywhere on campus.

GET AN ECO BOX

The **ECO BOX is a free program** on campus that provides returnable food containers to reduce single-use packaging.

BRING A REUSABLE MUG

Receive **\$0.25 off** any hot/cold beverage when you **bring your own mug** to a UVic Food Services outlet.

RESPONSIBLE WASTE DIVERSION

The first step to becoming a zero-waste campus will be sorting 100% of the waste on campus and diverting it from the Hartland Landfill.



WHAT DOES WASTE DIVERSION MEAN AT UVIC?

- 1. **Performing waste audits** to understand what products are going into our bins. From here, we can work with suppliers and **create policies** to minimize these materials (such as single-use food packaging) from entering campus in the first place.
- 2. **Developing education and opportunities** for staff and employees to **reduce**, **reuse**, **and recycle** items **without barriers**.

The Hartland Sanitary Landfill manages waste for the entire Capital Regional District, which includes just over 440 000 people.



SORT-IT-OUT

You will see Sort-it-Out bins throughout campus. These bins divert rigid plastic, metal, paper, and compost from the Hartland landfill.

Correctly using the Sort-it-Out bins **reduces our contamination rate** and supports our goal of 82% waste diversion.



DID YOU KNOW?

The Surfrider UVic Club collected 175 disposable cups and lids from a Sortit-Out station on campus in 45 minutes. They arranged the cups into their logo (a wave) and are using this art piece to advocate banning single-use packaging on campus.

Based on our data, the average campus user produces 265 lbs of waste per year, which is the equivalent to a Harbor Seal.

IMAGINE CARRYING A HARBOR SEAL ON YOUR BACK ALL YEAR.

There are approximately **100 custodians managing 22 000 people's waste** on campus. **That is 22 000 harbor seals of weighted waste**. Waste Reduction Services manages all waste and recycling at UVic.







PRACTICES AT UVIC

SUPPLIER CODE OF CONDUCT

UVic requires vendors to meet ethical, social, and environmental standards.

ECOVADIS RATINGS

Assesses suppliers' sustainability performance using a global tool—helping them improve.

ZERO WASTE GOALS

UVic has committed to advance itself toward a zero-waste campus.

UVIC BOOKSTORE

UVic's Bookstore offers Canadian-made, recycled, and reusable school supplies, and selecting brands with sustainability goals.

ELECTRONICS PURCHASING

All electronics bought by UVic University Systems are EPEAT-certified, designed to last longer and be easy to recycle.

CLOSING THE LOOP

- Choose <u>reusables</u> over disposables.
- Look for Fair Trade, local, recycled, or organic labels. Ask staff for help.
- Ask for reusable and ethically sourced options for clubs and events.
- Apply for <u>funding</u> to pilot low-waste events.
- Advocate for more circular options on campus!






RESPONSIBLE INVESTING

At UVic, your tuition, the province's investment, and other university resources support a system that fuels learning, research, and campus life. But what happens between when you pay and when those funds are spent? How does UVic manage its money—and why should responsible investment matter to you?

UVIC'S OPERATING BUDGET:WHO PAYS FOR CAMPUS LIFE?



STUDENT ADVOCACY DRIVES CHANGE

- UVic's <u>Working Capital Investment Policy</u> and <u>Responsible Investment Policy</u> are public for all to read and review.
- Student campaigns have historically helped shape UVic's approach to responsible investing.
- Recent changes have resulted in investment policy enhancements, including higher decarbonization and impact investing targets and a commitment to the principles of UN Global Compact.

Tuition & Government Grants Received



Student tuition and government grants arrive at UVic.

Funds are pooled as working capital - cash held for operations.

Funds pay for salaries, classes, scholarships, and campus services.

Remaining Funds Re-Invested

Unspent funds are pooled and invested for short-term safety and yield, overseen by UVic's treasury team.

*Different pools for endowments, sponsored research, ancillary (residences, food, bookstore) —donation and grant funds are managed separately from student tuition.

DID YOU KNOW?

- UVic has reduced the carbon intensity of its working capital carbon intensity by 80% since 2019.
- UVic's commitment to **impact investing** includes funding for the Indigenous economy, climate technology companies, and UVic's energy-efficient student housing buildings Čeqwəŋín ?é?ləŋ House and Sŋéqə ?é?ləŋ House.
- Annual reports are public ask questions, get involved!

WHAT YOU CAN DO

- **Connect** with a <u>UVic student group</u> that seeks to drive policy changes.
- **Join in:** Attend open Board of Governors meetings where investment policies are discussed, join advisory groups, and/or participate in student campaigns around responsible investment and social justice.
- **Ask questions:** Reach out to UVic's Treasury team to discuss investment policies, reports and/or additional updates & priorities.

WATER CONSERVATION



SHORTEN YOUR SHOWER

Reducing your shower time by 2 minutes can have a massive impact on not only water use, but energy use too.

SUDS AND SUCH

Any products you use on your body gets washed into the drain. Try to use **natural soaps and lotions** to protect your skin and the planet. Bonus points if you check out a **refillery!**

PROTECT THE PIPES

DO NOT FLUSH

- Floss
- Hair
- Menstrual products
- Medications, herbal supplements, eye drops, or creams
- Too much soap (due to our soft water, we can use 50% less)

WHAT IS SOURCE CONTROL?

Pollution prevention from what goes down the drain.



WHERE DOES OUR WATER COME FROM?

Greater Victoria's drinking water comes from Sooke Lake Reservoir.

It is one of the most stable drinking water sources in the Pacific Northwest.

REPORT LEAKS

In 2019, UVic discovered an underground leak that accounted for around 30% of the water usage on campus, the equivalent of approximately 200 million litres of water.
