The tale of **Mount Polley** continues. According to a <u>Vancouver Sun report last week</u>, "the BC Information and Privacy Commissioner has agreed to investigate a second complaint [originating from the **UVic Environmental Law Centre**] that the B.C. government is illegally holding back documents related to the Mount Polley mine tailings dam collapse." The Sun also noted that "the spill significantly damaged nine-kilometre-long Hazeltine Creek," and the damage to Quesnel Lake is still unclear. The Professional Employees Association, one of the staff unions here at UVic, is suggesting that a major reasons for this incident are the cuts the number of licensed professional overseeing mining operations. The PEA suggests that their "<u>Endangered Experts</u>" could have prevented the watershed damage.

In other watershed related news, our friends at **UVic's POLIS project and Centre for Global Studies** held a three-day forum earlier this year called <u>Watersheds 2014: Towards</u> <u>Watershed Governance in British Columbia and Beyond</u>. The proceedings from that gathering are now available as a resource and reference document for anyone researching or working on innovative new practices and processes within their watershed.

Reader might recall the **Columbia River Treaty**, which facilitated the construction of three hydroelectric dams on the Columbia River, when they think about watershed governance. The treaty between the US and Canada is now up for renewal and the **POLIS Project is hosting a book launch** on Thursday November 20th at 3:30 for "The Columbia River Treaty: A primer." The authors will explore new views related to the environment, equity, social justice, and the effects of a changing climate relative to the treaty.
