INDIGENOUS ART ON CAMPUS


Discover an inspiring collection of Indigenous art in buildings like the First Peoples House, Čeqwəŋín ?é?ləŋ (Cheko'nien House), Sŋéqə ?é?ləŋ (Sngequ House), the Cornett Building, and throughout our outdoor spaces. Carved poles, woven blankets, welcome figures, prints, button blankets and sculptures are reminders that we live and work within Indigenous territories. INDIGENOUS STUDENT LOUNGE

Located on the first floor of Sŋéqə ʔéʔləŋ, the Indigenous student lounge offers regular culturally specific programs and activities organized by friendly staff, as well as a common space for all Indigenous UVic students to connect with peers who share similar cultural backgrounds. Drop in to hang out, study, grab a snack or ask about campus resources.

MYSTIC VALE

Ləkwəŋən and WSÁNEĆ oral traditions tell us that this is a sacred site and a hunting and harvesting area. Popular walking trails wind through the forest where you'll find cedar, Douglas fir, arbutus, camas, deer, many bird species and traditional plant medicines.

PEOPLE

Campus Cousins

Campus Cousins are friendly upper-level Indigenous students who will welcome you at exciting social, cultural and recreational activities on and off campus.

Native Students Union

The Native Students Union is an organization run for and by Indigenous students. You'll have the opportunity to form community, support each other, advocate for Indigenous rights and wellbeing, and just exist together at UVic.

Elders in Residence

Elders are the keepers of sacred stories, songs, languages, cultures and traditions. You can stop by and visit one of the Elders at the First Peoples House for a friendly chat or cultural guidance.

Indigenous counsellors

Our Indigenous counsellors are here to help you navigate your transition to university life and to support you throughout your journey. This free service is open to all Indigenous students.

SERVICES

On-campus housing

If you're coming to UVic directly out of high school, you're eligible for a space in residence through the first-year guarantee. If you're graduating from high school in 2025, you need to apply for housing before May 1. You don't need an offer of admission in order to apply for on-campus housing. If you're not a current high school student, you can apply for on-campus housing and request a space in our dedicated Indigenous housing. These spaces are limited and successful applicants will be selected on a first-come, first-served basis. This accommodation is available for single undergraduate and graduate students. There are also dedicated spaces in Family Housing for students and their families. For more information and residence application deadlines, see uvic.ca/residence.

Student Wellness Centre

Indigenous Week of Welcome

Nearly every year since 2002, the number of Indigenous students enrolled at UVic has risen. In 2002, 529 Indigenous students were enrolled at UVic. By 2024, that number nearly tripled to 1,577!

INDIGENOUS STUDIES (BA) PROGRAM

Indigenous Studies is an area of study that emphasizes Indigenous ways of knowing and learning. Open to Indigenous and non-Indigenous students, the program explores the social, political cultural and historical



political, cultural and historical contexts that shape the lives and resurgence of Indigenous peoples—here and around the world. The program is offered as a minor and a major.

NEW SENĆOTEN LANGUAGE REVITALIZATION PROGRAM

Interested in passing on the SENĆOŦEN language to others? UVic's W,SENĆOŦEN IST Diploma in Indigenous Language Revitalization prepares you to do just that! This two-year community-based program is open to all students who have a passion for learning SENĆOŦEN. The next intake into this program will be fall 2026.

THE WORLD'S FIRST JOINT DEGREE PROGRAM IN CANADIAN COMMON LAW (JD) AND INDIGENOUS LEGAL ORDERS (JID)

Combining intensive study of Canadian Common Law and deep engagement with the laws of Indigenous peoples, you'll develop the skills needed to practice within Canadian Common Law, within Indigenous Legal Orders and at the interface between them. UVic will be the home of the new National Centre for Indigenous Laws (provisional name), which is expected to open in 2024.

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
Indigenous Living and Learning Community

Live with other Indigenous students in on-campus housing. The Indigenous Living Learning Community offers a fantastic opportunity to connect with other Indigenous students while away from home.

Take part in social and cultural activities to enhance your experience living on-campus. Activities could include beading, health and wellness programs and cooking.

If you self-identify as Indigenous and are an undergraduate student, you can apply to live in the Indigenous Living and Learning Community.

Tiffany Friesen. (Nuxalk, Ojibway/Cree) "I'm a first-year student and came straight from high school. The Indigenous Living Learning Community has helped me with my adjustment to university. You get to build really close friendships through study groups and regular community events. There are so many different resources available. Being surrounded by people with similar experiences and backgrounds is a big part of the Indigenous Living Learning Community that you wouldn't get anywhere else!"



Bring your learning into practice

Your experience matters. That's why UVic offers many opportunities to take what you learn in the classroom into real life work and research environments through hands-on learning, co-op placements, internships, field schools and cultural and academic exchanges.

CO-OP FOR INDIGENOUS STUDENTS

Take a break from your studies and apply your skills in the community. Our paid co-op placements offer you culturally and professionally relevant work opportunities and the chance to work with employers related to your program. Employers include community organizations, Indigenous governments, Indigenous companies and government agencies. Learn about many other co-op opportunities at uvic.ca/coop. If you have a specific position in mind, we will work with you to organize your own unique placement.

LE, NONET

During your time at UVic, you can access academic and leadership programs and needs-based financial aid offered by LE,NONET. You can use LE,NONET courses towards an Indigenous Studies degree or as electives in any other program.

INDIGENOUS EXCHANGE IN AUSTRALIA

If living abroad for a term interests you, you can apply for a co-op work placement at a partner institution in Australia through the Indigenous International Work-Integrated Learning Exchange.

Graduate with up to **16 months** of work experience and earn up to **\$53,000** (on average) over the course of your degree.

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Invest in your future

Your UVic education is a valuable investment that will reward you throughout your life. Finances should not be a barrier. No matter your financial situation, UVic offers opportunities to offset the cost of university through scholarships, awards, bursaries, co-op, work study and more.

HOW WILL I FUND MY EDUCATION?

Scholarships, awards and bursaries

Scholarships are awarded on the basis of academic merit. Awards are assigned on the basis of specific criteria. Bursaries are awarded on the basis of financial need.

In-course scholarships

In-course scholarships become available once you have completed a full-time academic year.

Athletic awards

Varsity athletes may be eligible for athletic awards.

Scholarships, awards and bursaries for Indigenous students

UVic offers over 90 scholarships, awards and bursaries to First Nations (status/non-status), Inuit and Métis students. To be eligible you will need to self-identify as Indigenous on your admission application and apply via the online scholarship application.



External awards

Bursaries

Indigenous students with identified financial need are eligible to apply for LE, NONET bursaries.

UVic Youth in Care Tuition Award

If you have been a youth in care in BC, you may be eligible for the UVic Youth in Care Tuition Award. It covers tuition and fees for the terms required for the completion of a first undergraduate degree. Eligible applicants may also receive funding to assist with the costs of books, supplies and living expenses. If you are transferring from another college or university, you are welcome to apply.

Emergency funds

If you face unexpected financial hardships while attending UVic, you can meet with the Office of Indigenous Academic and Community Engagement to apply for emergency funding.

Nation or band funding

Some bands and nations have funding to support your education. Contact your band, Nation, Métis organization or your UVic Indigenous recruiter to learn more.

ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIPS

If you're a high school student, or if you have graduated within the last two years, you may be eligible for entrance scholarships when you receive a conditional offer of admission based on your in-progress grades. Scholarships are available to students who meet a minimum admission average of 90%.

Special scholarships are available to

- Women and Indigenous Engineering and Computer Science students with a minimum admission average of 85%
- Indigenous students with a minimum admission average of 85%.

If you meet more than one scholarship criteria, scholarships may be combined! UVic also offers many scholarships based on a combination of admission average and other criteria.

While you do not need to apply for entrance scholarships based on admission average only, you do need to apply for specific criteria scholarships.

BC PROVINCIAL TUITION WAIVER PROGRAM

If you have been a youth in care in BC, you may be eligible for the BC Provincial Tuition Waiver. This program covers the cost of tuition and fees charged by the post-secondary institution for any credit or non-credit courses leading to a certificate, diploma, credential or undergraduate degree.
