

## Amy Verdun – bio for senate nomination

Dr Amy Verdun is Full Professor of Political Science at the University of Victoria (UVic) and an elected member of the Royal Society of Canada. She has held various service roles at UVic, including serving as the founder and inaugural Director of UVic's European Studies Program (1997-2005), Graduate Advisor in Political Science (2007-2009), Chair of the Political Science Department (2010-2013), and Undergraduate and Honours' Advisor (2023-2024). She previously served on the UVic Senate (2005-2006). Recently, her administrative work at UVic has included *inter alia* serving as mentor in the joint Faculty Association (FA)/Vice President Academic (VPAC) mentorship program (2021-2024), (co)chair of the Academic Women's Caucus (2022-2024), Chair of the University Academic Appointments Committee (2023-2025) and co-chair of the FA Membership Engagement Committee.

She also served in leadership roles on academic professional associations in Canada, the Netherlands, the UK and the US (e.g. European Union Studies Association, European Community Studies Association-Canada and the University Association for Contemporary European Studies (UACES)). Presently, she is serving as Vice-Chair of the European Consortium of Political Research (ECPR) – the largest European political science association.

She researches political economy, policy, governance, comparative politics, and European integration. She has published more than 150 articles and chapters, was guest editor of 21 special issues of journals (nine of which were reprinted as books); in total published 24 (co)authored books including a textbook *European Union Governance and Policy Making* (University of Toronto Press).

She has regularly held research grants from Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC) and benefited from European Union grants for teaching, research and outreach. She has taught at UVic since 1997, having taught all levels of undergraduate and graduate levels. She supervised to completion 40 Masters, 13 PhD students and 8 Postdocs. Her work has been recognised by UVic and professional awards.
