

I am an Associate Teaching Professor in the Department of Sociology at the University of Victoria, where I teach courses in crime and deviance, social theory, drugs and social policy, and racialization and decolonization. My academic work bridges political theory, criminology, and community advocacy, with a longstanding commitment to social justice, harm reduction, and equity-based public policy.

Throughout my career, I have worked at the intersection of university life and community engagement. I am a founding member of the Social Justice Centre, have served on anti-racism and equity committees, my department's Equity Committee, the Dean's Advisory Forum for Indigenization, and the Overdose Prevention and Harm Reduction Research Panel at UVic. My research and community partnerships focus on addressing the toxic drug crisis, advancing harm reduction, and supporting marginalized communities through participatory and community-based approaches.
