

Christine O'Bonsawin is a proud citizen of the Abenaki Nation (Odanak First Nation). She joined the University of Victoria in 2007 and was appointed to the Department of History and became the Director of Indigenous Studies (2007-2018). Currently, she is a Professor of History and serves as the History Graduate Advisor (2023-present).

She holds a Bachelor's degree in Sport Management from Brock University and both her Master's and PhD in Kinesiology (sport history specialization) from Western University. Christine is an interdisciplinary scholar whose research sits at the intersections of history, Indigenous studies, and socio-cultural sport studies. Her recent scholarship focuses on the legal and political rights of Indigenous peoples, especially in relation to the hosting of the Olympic Games and other mega-sporting events on unceded Indigenous territories in settler colonial states, including Canada. Her research highlights the ongoing impacts of colonialism while advancing conversations around sovereignty, resistance, and decolonization through sport and cultural practices.

Christine is widely published and recognized for her contributions to Indigenous and sport history. She is the co-author of *Challenging Racist "British Columbia": 150 Years and Counting* (2021), and the co-editor of several scholarly volumes, including *Intersections and Intersectionalities in Olympic History* (2014), *Indigenous Resurgence, Regeneration, and Decolonizing through Sport History* (2019), *(Un)Settling the Islands: Race, Indigeneity, and the Transpacific* (2020), and *Decolonizing Sport* (2023).
